SCIENCE ARTICLE

There are three different types of forces: pull, push and friction. Push and pull are relatively self-explanatory. Push and pull are defined as forces that cause an object to move from its resting position. In simpler terms, it is "pushed" away or "pulled" away, However, friction may not ring a bell. In the previous article, we discussed friction. Here is a little reminder: when you try to push a book along the floor, friction can make this difficult. Friction always work in the direction opposite to the direction in which the object is moving, or trying to move. Friction slows a moving object down.

"Now look yonder, can you see the huge, oak tree?"

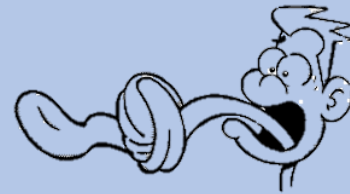
